ADVENT

We have entered in to the new liturgical year with the season of advent. In this new liturgical year the Gospel of Mathew will be the primary gospel proclaimed. We begin this season of Advent in a spirit of expectation. During this time we look forward not just to the birthday of Jesus at Bethlehem but also for his second coming at the end of time. Advent is a quiet time where we step back to the fundamental experience of Israel the experience of trustful waiting on the Lord's deliverance. It is a desert time when we try to empty our minds of the clutter of the past and when our hearts learn from the prophets what the deepest needs of our lives are. Advent reawakens hope and longing for a better future, a future for the redemption for the entire people. It is a season of great awakening, preparation, and great expectation of the birth of the Messiah . It is season of prayer when all Christians must turn to God in prayer. Therefore with the psalmist I pray for all of you "Peace be to your homes! may peace reign in your walls, and in your palaces, peace!" In faith and hope we begin advent with its first candle. With Mary and Joseph we wait for Christ. The candles light the way for us. The coming light of Jesus lights both our waiting and our journey in life. May the light of Jesus shine into our darkest corners of our life.

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

We are already half the way of the novena to the feast of Mary Immaculate, a feast very dear to the entire Salesian family. In the Immaculate Conception of Mary we are invited to recognize the dawn of the new world, transformed by the salvific work of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. The dawn of the

new creation brought about by divine mercy. For this reason the Virgin Mary, never infected by sin and always full of God, is the mother of a new humanity. She is the mother of the recreated world. The Immaculate Conception signifies that Mary is the first one to be saved by the infinite mercy of the Father, which is the first fruit of salvation which God wills to give to every man and woman, in Christ. For this reason the Immaculate One has become the sublime icon of the divine mercy which conquered sin.

Celebrating this feast entails *two things*. First: fully welcoming God and his merciful grace into our life. **Second:** becoming in our turn artisans of mercy by means of an evangelical journey. The Feast of the Immaculate Conception then becomes the feast of all of us if, with our daily "yes", we manage to overcome our selfishness and make the life of our brothers and sisters ever more glad, to give them hope, by drying a few tears and giving a bit of joy. In imitation of Mary, we are called to become bearers of Christ and witnesses to his love, looking first of all to those who are privileged in the eyes of Jesus. Feast of the Immaculate Conception has a specific message for us: it reminds us that in our life everything is a gift, it is all mercy. May the Blessed Virgin, first fruit of the saved, model of the Church, Holy and Immaculate Spouse, loved by the Lord, help us to ever increasingly rediscover divine mercy as the distinguishing mark of Christians.

STRENNA 2020 - "GOOD CHRISTIANS AND UPRIGHT CITIZENS"

In the Strenna 2020, the Rector Major emphasizes that "as a Salesian Family we must be attentive to the great human challenges of our world, such as honest people, living a committed citizenship that seeks the good of all. Salesian Family which is committed to the same cause needs to pay attention to human rights and, in particular, the rights of children who tend to be the most fragile. We need to emphasize on the encyclical *Laudato Sì*, which exhorts every human being to care for Creation. The Strenna 2020 offers us the opportunity to rebuild what Don Bosco taught and lived with his young people.

Fr Ángel explains that he has chosen these words of Don Bosco at a time when it is so difficult to be apostles and missionaries to the young, and we run the risk of not educating young people to 'a strong sense of citizenship, social justice and gospel values that lead them to



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to the migrants, and creation and care of the "common home" that is given to us. He says that this educational commitment of ours is an expression of Jesus' words: 'Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven' (Mt 6:10).

The Rector Major makes a direct reference to Don Bosco and the Oratory where we need to go back to the original sources to understand Don Bosco's thinking and ways of acting with and among young people as he prepared them for life in the 19th century Italy of his day. We need to 'teach politics', but the way Don Bosco did it, in an inoffensive way. His teaching was to the advantage of governments anywhere in the world, wherever the 'work of the Oratory' was established and tended



to 'form good citizens'.

Taking the two main parts of Don Bosco's saying: 'Good Christians', 'upright citizens', the Rector Major unpacks the meaning of each. 'Good Christians' are those who listen to God, are guided by the Spirit. For us to be educators and evangelizers of the young today means telling them, from our own experience, how God loves them, and we do this through our Salesian spirituality that opens their mind and heart. Here, the Rector Major cites the example of Fr. Tom Uzhunnalil, a prisoner in Yemen for 557 days, who was an effective witness through his prayer, endurance, goodness and silence.

This 'going out of ourselves' is further developed in the section on 'Upright citizens'. Young people await us in real life. Uprightness and honesty are seen especially in terms of 'keeping ourselves free from corruption' or, put more positively, 'creating a more visible culture of social ethics.' The presence of Mary reminds us of two dimensions that is love for God and love for humanity. She is the Mother who helps her children to fully live up to their commitment to God and the created world. Dear Sisters I exhort you to study, assimilate and live the Strenna in our life and mission.

ST. FRANCIS XAVIER

St. Francis Xavier travelled from countries to countries spreading the Good News wherever he went. He baptised many of the local communities and common people whom he encountered along his missionary journeys, and gained for the Lord many more souls. He encountered many difficulties and challenges along the way, and yet he persevered. He performed many miracles and wonders throughout his missionary journeys, and he even calmed a turbulent sea which threatened to sink his boat while he was on a missionary journey. He healed many of the sick and cast out demons. Francis approached people with the Gospel by becoming one among them. Arriving at Goa, he began his work of catechizing the Portuguese. From there he travelled to Sri Lanka, Malaysia, and Japan. In a letter from India he wrote, "I looked or desired for nothing here but to wear myself out with work and sacrifice for the Lord". Let us ask this great saint to intercede for us and make us ardent missionaries like him.

BL. PHILIP RINALDI

Don Bosco's third successor, Fr. Philip Rinaldi, was beatified by Pope John Paul II in 1990 and on 5th December we commemorate. Don Francesia wrote "Don Rinaldi was only missing the voice of Don Bosco: he had everything else!" He was a master of Salesian ways and spirituality, and brought about a renewal in the interior life of the Salesians with absolute confidence in God and unlimited trust in Mary Help of Christians. He took great care of the missions and sent many young Salesians to learn languages and customs so that they could be more immersed in local culture and spread the gospel more effectively. Through his intercession let us pray for the Volunteers of **D**on **B**osco and for an increase of vocations in this branch of the Salesian family whom he founded.

ST. STEPHEN

Saint Stephen's love of God kept him from yielding to the violent mob. His love for his neighbour made him pray for those who were stoning him to save them from punishment. Love inspired him to bring back those who erred, to the love of God. Love is the source of all that is good. He who walks in love can never go astray nor be afraid. Love guides, protects and brings us to the Lord Jesus. Let

us follow the example of St. Stephen in forgiving the offenders. Stephen died as Jesus did: falsely accused and brought to unjust condemnation because he spoke the truth fearlessly.

HOLY FAMILY

Families become holy when Christ Jesus is present in them. Jesus becomes truly present on the altar through the Sacrifice of the Holy Mass. Similarly, Jesus becomes truly present in a family when all the members live in the Christian spirit of love and sacrifice. This happens when there is mutual understanding, mutual support and mutual respect. On this feast of the Holy Family, let us gratefully remember and pray for our own parents and family members.
