My dearest Sisters, Loving & Prayerful Greetings for a hope - filled 2024!

The Divine charm of our little Jesus in the Crib warms our hearts with love and affection and dispels the pain we experience at the thought of our suffering people in the war-torn regions of the world...Only with our prayers can we reach out to them to bring them solace and comfort. Let us do so as frequently and as earnestly as possible. In the midst of all these happenings is the New Year 2024! We feel the need to ask: Hello 2024, What are you bringing for us? For Manipur, Israel, the Gaza Strip, Sudan and Ukraine? End of war and dawn of Peace? To the Infant in the Crib: "Though your hands are small, they are omnipotent. With a simple wave of your little hand, you can calm the raging waves of hatred, anger and revenge as You calmed the stormy sea of Galilee with a single word. "Be calm". Let us remind Him of it and offer sacrifices and ardent prayers for peace in the world.

The New Year opens with the celebration of **MARY MOTHER OF GOD**, and it is also the **WORLD DAY OF PEACE** as the Holy Father, Pope Francis, gifts the entire human world his message with the theme "Artificial Intelligence and Peace." Inspired by the papal letters "Pacem in Terris" of St. John XXIII and "Populorum Progressio" of St. Paul VI, Pope Francis recommends that the church play a greater role in our search for world peace.

"If artificial intelligence were used to promote integral human development, it could introduce important innovations in agriculture, education and culture," writes the Pope, adding that "the way we use it to include the least of our brothers and sisters, the vulnerable, and those most in need will be the true measure of our humanity." All must pay attention and choose well if we are to hand down a better, more peaceful world to the generations to follow." The Holy Father further highlights some of the potential risks posed by AI, for example, misinformation and social control, stressing the need for **regulation and monitoring of the development of AI** technologies so that they serve the human family and the protection of our common home.

The Pope concludes with an invitation to all: I hope that the foregoing reflection will encourage efforts to ensure that progress in developing forms of artificial intelligence will ultimately serve the cause of human fraternity and peace. It is not the responsibility of a few, but of the entire human family. Peace is the fruit of relationships that recognize and welcome others in their inalienable dignity and of cooperation and commitment in seeking the integral development of all individuals and peoples.

It is my prayer at the start of the New Year that the rapid development of forms of artificial intelligence will not increase cases of inequality and injustice all too present in today's world, but will help put an end to wars and conflicts and alleviate many forms of suffering that afflict our human family. May Christian believers, followers of various religions, and men and women of good will work together in harmony to embrace the opportunities and confront the challenges posed by the digital revolution and thus hand on to future generations a world of greater solidarity, justice, and peace.

STRENNA - 2024 "THE DREAM THAT MAKES YOU DREAM" A heart that transforms "wolves" into "lambs."



Marking the Bi-centenary year of the dream of Don Bosco, the Rector Major Fr. Agnel Cardinal Fernandez Artime, referring to the visionary dream, which he calls "A Precious jewel in the charism of Don Bosco's family," he bequeathed the Strenna of the year 2024 to the entire Salesian family. Rector Major, referring to the dream of Don Bosco, said that the Boys were extraordinary, in the dream of Don Bosco, and the boys we met over the last 200 years and will still meet in the future. I would like to highlight a few crucial features among the many that Rector Major emphasises. In the first instance, to look at the dream itself with three initial dispositions: faith, being children of God, and discipleship

are "essential keys" to understanding and taking on, for ourselves, what Don Bosco has narrated and left us as a spiritual legacy. The second is to "look" at the most important part of the dream: "the Young people." We, as the Daughters of Mary, must know how to look like John. When we fail to see the situations experienced by young people, even the most peaceful ones, those who do not seem to have problems but who face every day the difficulty of making their dreams come true, and again when we do not see them for what they are, whether in their most authentic and beautiful form or in their most tragic and painful one. Our age is scarred by deep social wounds, but let's not have any illusions. It was not so much different in Don Bosco's time; yesterday, poverty drove young people to steal; today, it drives them to deal; yesterday, they wielded knives; today, it's guns. We are faced with this reality, and we need to intervene as Don Bosco did. The third is the verb learn, that the teacher in the dream tells us. We must study, try to understand, and learn; in this way, we will become humble, strong, and energetic to face all the difficulties of life. To learn is to be strong, but we are not talking about physical strength; it is a strength that is *resilience*, or, in other words, the ability not to be discouraged, not to let our arms down, as a sign that nothing can be done. To overcome the temptation to easily abandon our call or passively wait for everything to happen, this danger must be warded off with fortitude and disarmed with the humility of those who are aware of their limitations but also know that they can count on God's constant presence. Learning means not only studying the evil of our time but also learning a method to educate, and the method is all in the dream: goodness, respect, and patience. The teacher tells us to be patient, give everything time, and give God time. You can, with your choices, direct, guide, and influence, but it is God who does everything. Rector Major concludes his commentary on the Strenna, expressing the many dreams that he holds in his heart for the young people and for us. He greatly desires to continue growing in charismatic fidelity, encouraging us to seek and translate Don Bosco's dream into a reality in today's context. Let us wholeheartedly strive for it. We can and must learn from Don Bosco; like him, we must stand with young people side by side, offering healthy alternatives empowering them to make brave choices.



FEAST OF BL. LAURA VICUNA

Blessed Laura Vicuña whose feast we celebrate on January 22, ascended to eternity in the year 1904, at the age of 12. Her life of virtue and sacrifice has been an inspiration to many, and she was beatified by Pope John Paul II on September 3, 1988. Blessed Laura Vicuña is considered a model of purity, piety, and sacrificial love, and she is venerated as a patroness of victims of abuse and those who suffer unjustly. Laura's sanctity unfolded in the subtleties of her daily existence. One evening, after supper, Laura and her companion Merceditas sought permission to interrupt their game for a prayer at the Sacred Heart statue near the entrance. The statue's elevated position thwarted their desire to kiss its feet. How were they to do it?

Twenty-five years later, Sr. Merceditas recalls, "Laura prayed with such fervor and trust that the statue came down to us, giving us the joy of paying it that homage. Naturally such things were told to no one". One more example from her life: repeatedly, a girl harboring jealousy towards Laura engaged in the malicious act of concealing the wood meticulously prepared by Laura for the morning stove in their classroom. The teacher's arrival revealed an extinguished stove bereft of the essential fuel. The prospect of reprimand, no matter how delicately administered by Sr. Azocar, always proves challenging, particularly when unjust. Remarkably, Laura refrained from offering excuses, promptly making her way to the woodshed. Those responsible for the mischievous deed, finding amusement in hiding her wood beneath the desks, taunted her. Undisturbed, Laura responded with calm serenity, remarking, "OK, I have gained an extra merit for heaven. In another instance, a different girl used to provide herself with a bottle of water, and since her place in class was near the stove, she could skillfully pour the water on the fire as soon as it was beginning to light up. Again, another time, "calmly and serenely," even if it cost her, Laura bent over the stove and relit the fire, to the admiration of all the students.

Sr. Piai says: "Laura had a degree of humility unusual for a child of her age; she was jovial, always ready, at the first tinkle of the bell." Yes, one ring was sufficient for her to cut short whatever work she had been doing. Any gesture was enough to lead her to the heights of heroism. She had a high appreciation for precision, a readiness and ease in carrying out her duty - all of which revealed her anxiety about becoming a saint. Laura's unwavering resolve and serene demeanor in the face of adversity revealed her remarkable strength of character and garnered respect from those around her. Let this little Saint of ours inspire us to be concerned to become saints in our daily lives which in turn becomes encouragement for our young people to live a life of values that leads to eternity.
