SEASON OF CREATION



"Let Justice and Peace Flow" is the theme of this year's ecumenical Season of Creation, inspired by the words of the prophet Amos: "Let justice flow on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream" (5:24).

^{A Mighty River} The season of creation begins on 1 September, the World Day of Prayer, for the care of creation, and ends on 4 October, the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of ecology loved by many Christian denominations. In a world facing escalating environmental challenges such as climate change, habitat loss, and pollution, the Season of Creation offers a platform for individuals and communities to engage in discussions, prayer, and practical initiatives aimed at fostering a deeper connection with the natural world and advocating for its protection. Pope Francis in his message for the world day of Prayer for the care of Creation puts forward a question: "How can we contribute to the mighty river of justice and peace in this Season of Creation? What can we, particularly as Christian communities, do to heal our Common Home so that it can once again teem with life?" He continues by answering it: "We must do this by resolving to transform our hearts, our lifestyles, and the public policies ruling our societies."

The message of His Holiness Pope Francis and the 3rd priority of GC XXIV beckon us to network with our neighbouring communities, in the schools, in the parishes in this Season of Creation, as followers of Christ on our shared Synodal journey, to work and pray that our Common Home will once again abound with life. It's significant to be considerate that effective networking involves building genuine relationships based on trust and mutual respect.

TEACHERS' DAY

The concept of celebrating teacher's day dates back to antique culture. In India, Teacher's Day is observed on September 5th in memory of Dr. Sarvepalli Radhakrishnan, a renowned philosopher, and India's second President, who believed in the power of education. Rather than accepting gifts on his birthday, he advocated for dedicating the day to teachers, highlighting their vital role in nation-building. This tradition has since spread globally and is observed in various forms and on different dates across different cultures. The importance of



We shall earnestly strive to impart this charism of ours to the lay collaborators, and teachers of our **institutions** who play a role in shaping individuals and societies. May this celebration, not only show appreciation to the teachers but also inspire future generations to uphold the torch of knowledge, ensuring a brighter and more enlightened future for all.

BIRTHDAY OF BLESSED VIRGIN MARY

One might wonder, why is the birthday of Our Lady so special, and what can we learn from this special event? While there are many reasons stemming from Sacred Scripture and Tradition, to commemorate Mary's birthday, there may perhaps be one simple, yet endearing significance which we will find helpful: **"Temple of the Lord".** The Nativity of the Blessed Virgin was the day that God had constructed His temple; the day on which a creature became the preferred dwelling place of God. In remembering her, we remember that God, in His grace,



mystery, and love, has chosen to concern Himself with mankind so intimately as to "come to them and make our home with them" (John 14:23).

A reflection on the birth of Mary draws the mystery and wonder of God's love into focus. How is it that this indescribable God of all creation, has not only chosen a little girl to be His temple, but also chose to become incarnate through her, "so that everyone who believes in Him may not perish but may have eternal life"(John 3:16). It is such an understanding of God - a God who is so intimately concerned with mankind - that forms the distinguishing mark of the Christian faith.

Commemorating the Nativity of Mary leads us to ponder on the divine nature of Jesus Christ, and in pondering His divinity; we come to acknowledge the immensity and humility of God's love that is offered to every person. While Blessed Mary had the special privilege to be the temple of the Lord both physically and spiritually, we are reminded that God also calls everyone to the same grace of being the dwelling place of God.

St. John affirms in his letters to the early Church, "By this we know that we abide in Him and He in us, because he has given us of his Spirit" (1 John 4:13). Reflecting on this special importance of the Nativity of our Mother helps to put into perspective that truly, every person is a precious child of God, a temple of the Holy Spirit.

When birthdays are celebrated, we celebrate the gift of a person, the life that he or she has, and the joy that they have brought to their loved ones. But as we celebrate the birthday of Mary, we discover that there is also a bigger reason we can rejoice—God dwells in this person.

In the Catholic devotion to Mary, we see that it is because of God that she is remembered, it is the grace of God that she was made holy. Her nativity is remembered because she is the dawn that points to the coming light of Christ. In a similar way, we see that every child is called to holiness in Christ, to be the light and salt of the earth. As we celebrate the earthly birthday of Blessed Mary, let us also celebrate the joy of our identity as the dwelling place of God, His chosen people.

CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS

September 9 and 10 mark the Centenary Celebrations at Shillong. It is marked by the presence of our beloved Mother General Mother Chiara Cazzuola, the General Councilors Sr. Celine Jacob, Sr. Nilza Fatima de Moraes and Sr. Runita Borja and the FMA Provincials of India and other representatives. Shillong having the highest number of vocations in the FMA world, and having had many missionaries as their pioneers, merit having the privilege of concluding the Centenary celebrations. CONCLUSION

Prior to the opening of the II Vatican Council when Pope St. John XXIII was asked what the main purpose of this Council was, He said: "To open the windows of the Church and let in some fresh air". One of the windows he opened was the window of relationship with other religions. One of the Documents of the Council is "Declaration on the Relation of the Church to Non-Christian Religions", in which the Council gives clear indications on what, should be our attitude towards our brothers and sisters of other Faiths.

The Celebration of the World Youth Day at Lisbon and the forth coming Synod on Synodality for which Pope Francis had been preparing the whole Church from the year 2021, are other incentives which should spur us on towards relationship and Communion. The Synod was formally opened on 9 October 2021 with the theme: "Communion, Participation, Mission". The final gathering will be in October 2023 in Rome. For the first time in the 2000+ year history of the Church, 1.37 billion Catholics have been invited to join in this two-year long process of listening and discernment. Much work has been going on at the grass-root level. As children of Don Bosco whose love for the Church, we have the bounden duty to pray earnestly and offer sacrifices for the fruitful outcome of this Synod on Synodality.

Let us take this path of relationship and communion beginning from our own communities and work place and then move on to wider circles. Let Mary be our inspiration in this important journey which will ask of us for a compassionate and sacrificing love. Reflecting on the Sorrows of Mary St. Anselm says: "While other martyrs suffered by sacrificing their own lives, the Blessed Virgin suffered by sacrificing her Son's life, a Life that she loved far more than her own; so that she not only suffered in her soul all that her Son endured in His Body but moreover, the sight of her Son's torments, brought more grief to her heart, than if she had endured them all in her own person".
