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

My dearest Sisters, Prayerful and affectionate Greetings from the Provincial House Bangalore!

In this post-synodal period, we are waiting to know the outcome of the synodal assembly that was held in Rome from 4-29 October 2023. Participants consisting of Bishops, priests, religious and lay people, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, in the company of Mary, Mother of the Church and with our great leader Pope Francis, prayed, studied, reflected, dialogued and discussed together on many burning issues relevant to the Church of this post- COVID, war-torn world. We await for the decisions the Synod has arrived at and people of God and those of good will may continue the journey of life on the path of communion and solidarity.

THE COMMUNION OF SAINTS

November commences with the observance of both *All Saints Day* and *All Souls Day*. The former prompts us to reflect on our celestial companions, while the latter directs our thoughts to those in Purgatory. Feast of All Saints, marks a time when we celebrate the vast Communion of Saints. It is a day dedicated to remembering and honoring the saints, both the canonized and non-canonized holy figures. Pope Gregory III established this day as a special occasion for venerating the saints. The celebration of All Saints' Day also highlights the universal call to holiness. It reminds the Catholics that everyone is



called to be saints, to live lives of faith, love, and service to others (LG 40). The saints are seen as role models and intercessors, showcasing the possibilities of a life lived in profound union with God. It's a day to reflect on the lives of the saints and to seek inspiration from their examples of faith and virtue. All Saints' Day focuses on the canonized saints, while All Souls' Day follows on November 2nd, which is dedicated to praying for all the faithful departed, especially those in purgatory, who are believed to be on their way to heaven. This day is a time to remember and pray for the souls of the departed and to offer hope for their eventual entrance into God's presence. In the life of Don Bosco, we read the miraculous escape of a young lad Charles from hell to heaven after making a good confession. Charles, a 15-year-old boy who frequented Don Bosco's oratory of Saint Francis de Sales, all of a sudden fell critically ill. Living on the upper floor of his father's small restaurant, Charles teetered on the brink of death. When the doctor declared his condition critical, the parents were urged to seek confession for their son, who fervently wished to see Don Bosco, his regular confessor. However, Don Bosco was out of town, and the assistant pastor arrived instead. Sadly, the boy passed away, persistently longing for Don Bosco. Upon Don Bosco's return, he was informed of the boy's repeated requests to see him before his passing. Despite being told the

boy had died twelve hours earlier, Don Bosco maintained he was not dead but merely sleeping. He entered the wake room, where the boy lay prepared for burial. With a prayer, Don Bosco called upon Charles, who miraculously awakened, relating a terrifying dream and a concealed sin from his last confession. With Don Bosco's guidance, the boy confessed, seeking absolution. During the episode, Charles intermittently conversed, demonstrating lucidity despite his cold body. In a poignant moment, Don Bosco presented the choice between staying or going to Heaven, to which Charles chose the latter, peacefully passing away.

This incident is also an invitation for us to contemplate both our life and mortality. St. John Bosco's zeal for the salvation of souls led him to raise the dead boy and hear his confession. While we may not be able to perform such miracles, we can certainly pray for the souls entrusted to us as well as those souls in purgatory. Let us be generous with our prayer, mortifications, offering our work, and above all, by offering the fruits of the Holy Mass for the souls in Purgatory. This collective effort will assist them in making amends for their faults and thus find their way to heaven. Eventually, each of us will depart from this world. Throughout history, sages have urged us to view death as a continuation of our eternal journey, encouraging us not to dread or dismiss it. As our love for God deepens, the fear of death vanishes. Stronger faith in God diminishes the sting of death, while unwavering hope in God alleviates the pain. Moreover, let us remember that the observance of "All Souls Day" in November is a period where the Church provides opportunities to obtain indulgences and make amends for our sins.

ST. ARTEMIDE ZATTI SDB

In recognition of his exemplary life and service, St. Artemide Zatti was canonized by Pope Francis on October 15, 2022. His canonization was a testament to his remarkable devotion to serving the less fortunate and his embodiment of Christian Virtues. St. Artemide Zatti loved his sick in a very touching way. He saw Jesus himself in them, so much so that when he asked the sisters for a dress for a new boy who had just arrived, he would say: "Sister, do you have a dress for a 12-year-old Jesus?" His care for the sick was done with great care that it had its own delicate nuances. Some people remember seeing him carrying the body of a patient who had died during the night on his shoulders towards the mortuary, to remove it from the sight of the other patients: and he did this while reciting the De profundis. Faithful to the Salesian Spirit and to the motto bequeathed by Don Bosco to his sons - "work and temperance" - he carried out a prodigious activity with habitual readiness of spirit, with a heroic spirit of sacrifice, with absolute detachment from any personal satisfaction, without ever taking holidays or rest. It's said that the only five days of the rest he had were spent... in prison! Yes, he had also known the prison, because of the escape of a prisoner in hospital, for which the blame was on him. He was absolved and his return home was a triumph. He achieved holiness through a daily exercise of charity. Let us follow him in perseverance of our daily exercise of charity also invoke his intercession for all the sick and suffering especially our sisters and the dear ones of our sisters.

BL. MAGDALENE MORANO

Every 15th of November, we honor Blessed Magdalene Morano, who was a 'teacher' par excellence. She embodied intelligence, abundant love, goodness, lively spirit, and profound wisdom. Born at Chieri, Turin, on 15 November 1847, Magdalene Catherine Morano began from her youth a teaching career among local children, which was to last for the rest of her life, especially after obtaining her teacher's qualification. In 1879 with a wealth of educational and catechetical experience, she became a Daughter of Mary Help of Christians, and asked from God "to remain alive until she had attained sanctity". In 1881 she was sent to Sicily, and there she began a flourishing work of education among the girls and young

women of the poor and working classes. With "one eye on earth but ten constantly on heaven", she opened schools, oratories, hostels and workshops in every part of the island. Looking at the sea she would say: "Do you see how vast, how immense the sea is? God's bounty is greater by far!" And with a simple but incisive example she would illustrate the way to holiness: "You climb the high mountain of perfection with constant mortification. Even the tallest houses are made of small stones, piled one upon the other". Her exhortations enlighten, comfort and encourage: "Think as Jesus would have thought. Pray as Jesus would have prayed. Act as Jesus would have acted". This is what Mother Magdalene used to say and this is how she lived, repeating to herself: "Ask for the grace to bear your cross peacefully every day."She is revered and her remains are honored at the Chapel of the Salesian Sisters in Ali Terme, located in Messina.May she continue to inspire and help us in our mission of spreading the Good news to all who are around us!

MAMMA MARGARET- SERVANT OF GOD

November 25th is the day we honor Venerable Margaret Occhiena, who was the belovedmother of Don Bosco. When in 1846, John became seriously ill, Margaret moved to Turin to care for him. John asked her to stay to help with the work for the poor and abandoned boys that were entering the city. Margaret would work in the oratory for 10 years, serving all the boys that were there. She became known affectionately as "Mamma Margaret". She was the very first Salesian Cooperator. She is known to have started the *Salesian "Goodnight"*, a short reflection that she would give the young boys before they went to sleep. And her way of teaching and living is what inspired the Preventive System. As we look to this extraordinary Christian woman, we ask ourselves, 'Would John Bosco have been Don Bosco, the father and educator of countless young people, without her teaching, example, inspiration, and support? In fact,March 2020, Pope Francis reminded the Salesians in his message to the GC28 by asking, "Could your establishments have existed without this faithful woman?" This is why the Church wishes to offer her as an example to all mothers- not because she was the mother of a saint, but because she herself was a saintly Christian mother.Let us pray to her earnestly and desire that she will be raised soon to the altars like our Father and Founder Don Bosco.
