

BL. PHILIP RINALDI

Blessed Philip Rinaldi, born on May 28, 1856, in Lu Monferrato (Alessandria), was captivated by the charism of Don Bosco at the age of 22. His early connection with the saint shaped his life profoundly. As a priest, he played a vital role in the formation of aspirants and novices, instilling in them the spirit of Salesian values. In 1899, Fr. Rua appointed him as the director of the community of Sarriá, Spain, and later as provincial leader. In these roles, he significantly contributed to the growth of the Salesian mission in Spain, solidifying its foundations and expanding its influence.

As Vicar General of the Congregation, Blessed Philip's paternal spirit and visionary leadership came to the fore. He established formation centres offering spiritual and social assistance to young working women and spearheaded initiatives like printing works. His guidance and support during a challenging period in the history of the Salesian Sisters

proved invaluable. A fervent promoter of Salesian collaboration, he strengthened the Cooperators and founded the World Federations of Past Pupils for both men and women. His foresight led to the creation of the Volunteers of Don Bosco, a new form of consecrated life in the world.


Elected Rector Major in 1922, Blessed Philip dedicated himself to adapting Don Bosco's spirit to the needs of the time. A master of spiritual life, he prioritised the renewal of spiritual fervour within the Salesian family and fostered Salesian studies. His unwavering trust in God and devotion to Mary Help of Christians underpinned his endeavors. He actively supported missionary efforts, ensuring young Salesians who were equipped to evangelize effectively by learning the languages and customs of the people they served.

Blessed Philip Rinaldi passed away on December 5, 1931, and his remains are venerated in the crypt of the Basilica of Mary Help of Christians. Beatified on April 29, 1990, by St. John Paul II, his memorial is celebrated annually on December 5. Following his example, let us strive to emulate his virtues—his faith, zeal, and dedication—so that we too may live out Don Bosco's spirit in our times and circumstances. May his life inspire us to greater holiness and service!

IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

CONCLUSION

On November 26, 2024, India proudly celebrated the 75th anniversary of the adoption of its Constitution, a cornerstone of our democratic identity. On this day in 1949, the Constituent Assembly finalised the Constitution, laying the foundation for a sovereign, socialist, secular, and democratic republic. This monumental document came into force on January 26, 1950, marking the birth of the Indian Republic.

Constitution Day, formally recognised in 2015, serves as a reminder of the values enshrined in the Preamble—justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity—and the vision of our founding leaders. Every community is called to embody and perpetuate the Salesian charism, ensuring its vitality for the young. Let us not use the changing times as an excuse but trust in the Lord, who guides history and knows what humanity needs for its salvation. With hope and apostolic fervour, let us invoke the Holy Spirit to illuminate our steps as we prepare for the future.

I also encourage you to meditate on Article 73 of our Constitutions, which Mother recommended:

"In gratitude to God for having called us to the life of the Daughters of Mary Help of Christians, let us be especially responsible for vocations to our Institute. Let us ask for vocations by incessant prayer and by our own joyful and constant fidelity."

Let this reflection renew our zeal and inspire us to live our vocation with joy, prayer, and faithfulness.

Once again, I extend my heartfelt wishes to you, dear Sisters, esteemed members of the Salesian Family, the educating community, Parish Priests, and Salesians whose invaluable service enriches our mission. May your Christmas be filled with profound joy, and may the New Year bring an abundance of peace.
