Holy Week:




kingship was limited to earthly expectations, while Jesus was on a mission far greater—bringing salvation through His sacrificial love.


of suffering. As we reflect, we are challenged to ask ourselves: Where do I need to receive forgiveness? Where am I called to extend forgiveness to others?

active in ministry but to be living witnesses of the Gospel, radiating hope and joy, especially in the face of challenges.

Pope Francis also invites us to reflect on the role of new technologies in our lives. His prayer intention for April challenges us to pray that these tools may not replace human relationships or the dignity of the person, but rather help us confront the crises of our times with compassion and solidarity.

May this Easter inspire us to renew our covenant with God, to live out our vocation with generous hearts, and to be vibrant signs of hope and love in every community we touch. Let us carry the light of the Resurrection in our hearts, illuminating the path for others with the hope that never fades.
