This year's anniversary invites us not only to look back with reverence and gratitude but also to look ahead with hope and responsibility. As our beloved Mother General shares in her recent circular, "The

reflections shared during the plenary session offered us an in-depth look at the journey of the Provinces and Preprovinces. In the light of the canonical and animation visits of the triennial verifications carried out so far, we can affirm that the broad lines outlined by General Chapter XXIV are giving a transformational and generative impulse for new life. "A GLANCE AT THE CRUCIFIX GIVES ME THE STRENGTH AND THE COURAGE TO WORK." From the Pearls of St. Maria Troncatti -

As we approach the canonisation of St. Maria Troncatti, our hearts are brimmed with joy and profound

gratitude. She is now officially recognised by the Church not only as a missionary and healer but as a saint—a living witness of the Gospel in action.

Maria Troncatti was not in the lime light in her lifetime. She did not seek recognition or applause. Yet, her life quietly echoed the Beatitudes: poor in spirit, merciful, a peacemaker. Her sainthood is not based on grandiose miracles or dramatic gestures, but on her daily, hidden and heroic fidelity to God and the people entrusted to her.

Sent to the heart of the Ecuadorian Amazon, she became one with the Shuar people—not merely to

serve them, but to live among them, listening, learning, and loving without conditions. In her, we see a woman who fully embraced the Salesian missionary spirit: strong and gentle, prayerful and practical, radically available to the demands of the Gospel.

What made her service fruitful was not only her skill as a nurse or the sacrifices she endured—it was her ability to build bridges, to heal wounds not just of the body but of hearts and cultures. She was a woman of reconciliation in a time and place often marked by tension, suspicion, and conflict. With humility and deep interiority, she lived her consecration as a space of encounter—between the Gospel and indigenous cultures, between suffering and hope.

St. Maria Troncatti shows us that mission is not something we *do "for"* others; it is something we *become "with" others*. Her sanctity was incarnated in the dusty trails of the forest, in makeshift clinics, in whispered prayers, and in the silent offering of her life. Her martyrdom was not in blood but in self-giving love—each day poured out for others until the very end.

As we prepare to celebrate her canonisation, let us take this time to allow her life to question us, shape us, and lead us back to the heart of the Gospel. May she intercede for us, that we too may become artisans of peace, women of hope, and missionaries of joy—wherever we are!
